RCD HISTORY

RCD AT A GLANCE

The Richmond Committee on Disability (RCD) was established in 1985 through the joint effort of United Way of the Lower Mainland, Special Needs & Social Planning divisions of the City of Richmond along with several people with disabilities from the community. It is a non-profit, registered charitable society (# 88832 8432 RR0001).

The Society's purpose is to give people with disabilities the opportunity to participate in the community to the fullest extent of their ability and desires and to improve their quality of life by working for – Inclusion, Independence & Empowerment. The RCD serves as an advisory body and spokes group to local government, business and community on issues and barriers faced by people with disabilities and the society's work has contributed to the overall physical and attitudinal accessibility of the city.

As the official advisory group to the City, Council appoints a member to liaise with the RCD; Councillor Andy Hobbs is the current council liaison for 2024. Program Manager, Melanie Burner, at the Community Social Development of the City is the designated staff liaison. In addition, Richmond City Council appoints an RCD member to sit on the City's Advisory Design Panel, the Accessibility Advisory Committee, the Senior Advisory Committee, and the Intercultural Advisory Committee, also to sit on special purpose advisory committees as established.

The RCD is a member of the Richmond Community Services Advisory Council, Richmond Poverty Reduction Coalition, as well as a few reference groups on new projects and innovations. Moreover, RCD is, through our physical centre, an accredited member of the national organization Independent Living Canada (IL Canada).

IL Canada was founded in 1986, by the Independent Living Movement Membership, represents the network of IL Member Centres at the national level. IL Canada performs several functions on behalf of Member Centres including: providing a collective voice on national issues; fostering and maintaining partnerships; building the capacity and scale of IL in Canada; and preserving the integrity and importance of IL in Canada on the national stage.

ORGANIZATION'S MANDATE

RCD's mandate is to support people with disabilities to lead a more independent life of their choice. The organization respects "Dignity, Knowledge, Diversity and Self-Determination", which forms the basis of our service provision.

RCD Mission Statement:

The RCD is committed to empowering people of all abilities to participate with dignity and confidence in their community and achieve independence to their fullest capabilities through a friendly environment, which provides information, resources, training and support, while increasing public awareness and promoting universal accessibility.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN COMMUNITY

- RCD will be facing an interim relocation in May 2024; due to delay of the construction schedule of the redeveloped site to which RCD will take permanent residence and the expiry of the lease at current location. The relocation plan has been confirmed, with a goal to minimize the interruption of services to our members.
- The year 2023 RCD has returned to full normal, with many newly added activities, services, programs and events; including but not limited to, monthly Community Services Pop-Up, Invisible Disability Awareness Week, International Self-Care Day, Job Fair, 2023 United Nation's International Day of Persons with Disabilities Celebration, IL Across Canada Day, Emergency Preparedness for Persons with Disabilities, Community Appreciation Week, Running Club, Sports Club, Gardening Club and more.
- RCD has resumed full operation in 2022, with in-person, hybrid and virtual activities.
 For the second half of 2022, more focus was on the encouragement of in-person interactions.
- RCD, following the BC Provincial Health Orders, was gradually implementing the Re-Start Plan since July 2021, bringing back some in-person services and activities at the physical location at the Lansdowne Centre.
- RCD survived the COVIC-19 pandemic since March 2020 and continued to offer services and opportunities for people with disabilities to access programs and projects via both virtual and limited in-person activities. Staff members started working remotely, and they greatly narrowed the technology divide and improved the work efficiency through planning and implementing enterprise resource planning. Most members were connected to the RCD and each other via newsletters, emails, phone calls, visits to office, and on Social Media.
- For the Municipal by-election in May 2021 and Provincial election in October 2020, the RCD, in partnership with the Richmond Poverty Reduction Coalition, worked collaboratively to share candidates' information and platforms by online postings on their organization websites, in lieu of a physical All Candidates Meeting.

- Van Accessible Parking Space was adopted by the City of Richmond bylaws, with specific signage and layout, in October 2018; RCD was instrumental to the changes.
- RCD hosted the inaugural Wheelchair Curling Bonspiel in 2007; this has turned into an annual event and greatly increased the exposure of wheelchair sports and athletes with disabilities. In 2022 they celebrated 14th Anniversary of the event 2022 Canadian Open, and with 6 teams' participation. The event was suspended for 2020 due to COVIC-19 pandemic and will pause for 2021 due to venue mechanical issues.
- Starting 2005 the RCD offered Disability Awareness and Sensitivity Training to caregivers, agencies, businesses and Government officials. In 2022, 134 participants received the training, via virtual training.
- RCD was the proud recipient of the "2012 Association of the Year" of the Business Excellence Awards hosted by the Richmond Chamber of Commerce on November 21, 2012.
- RCD was part of the planning committee of the City of Richmond to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of Rick Hansen's World Tour; the event was hosted at the Richmond Olympic Oval in May 2012.
- RCD became a Safe Harbour Certified Location in April 2012, building a welcoming place for all to live and work.
- RCD worked closely with the City of Richmond's Transportation Department since 2007, in a liaison role to the community representing people with vision loss, in the development of "Accessible Pedestrian Signals" throughout the city.
- Working with city staff, the RCD drafted a "Universal Housing Design Bylaw". Initiated
 in 1995 the concept was approved by Council in the Fall of 2007 as a result of a
 collaborative effort by the RCD with the Urban Development Institute and City staff. It
 addresses the functional needs of everyone; children, adults, and seniors with or
 without disabilities, in a user-friendly environment.
- As a result of the RCD working in partnership with the City, Richmond was presented
 with the "5 Star Award for Accessibility" in 1991 by the Federation of Canadian
 Municipalities, Secretary of State and National Committee on Disabilities. Richmond
 was the only City in Canada to be given the full 5-star award for accessibility.
- Working with the RCD, City staff developed accessibility requirements for city buildings, greater than the provincial standard for use in construction or renovation of all City owned facilities.
- A curb cut design created by the RCD for the City Centre area, which addressed the needs of both wheelchair users and the visually impaired, is now being used in other provincial communities.
- Working with community developers, the RCD provided input relating to accessibility for many commercial and residential developments, which assisted the developers in creating more user-friendly projects.

- The RCD was a facilitator and partner in the 1995 establishment of the Richmond Therapeutic Equestrian Society, which provides a therapeutic horseback riding program in Richmond for children and youth with disabilities run under Canadian Therapeutic Equestrian Society (CanTRA) guidelines.
- The RCD provided HIV/AIDS prevention presentations in Richmond High schools and the community, held three successful "WALKS for HIV/AIDS" to create awareness about the disease and raise funds for the program.
- Bringing together the City, a local developer and the False Creek Residence Society the RCD facilitated the establishment of the Steveston Residence. Located at No. 1 Road and Steveston Highway this is an integrated project of 20 apartments; 10 of which are purposely built for people with disabilities and require full time attendant care. The other 10 units are affordable apartments for families, responding to the need for residential housing for people with disabilities, as well as affordable housing for others. The 10 family apartments embrace universal design.
- As part of our community education initiative, the RCD worked with City staff to develop a Scooter Safety awareness brochure for the community, a project supported by funding from ICBC. The brochure covers many aspects of ownership and their safe use on City streets.

KEY MILESTONES

- RCD is planning to celebrate its 40th Anniversary since inception in 2025. It will also be
 the 25th Anniversary of the physical establishment of the *resource centre* to provide
 direct services to people with disabilities
- RCD hosted a successful in-person Fundraising Dinner on October 20, 2023, and
 officially launched a Fundraising Campaign to raise funds for the interim relocation. We
 have reached 50% of our target venturing into 2024.
- 2023 RCD Fundraising Campaign was the most comprehensive so far, with 12 fundraising initiatives and received overwhelming support from members and the community. We have reached and above our fundraising target by 10%.
- RCD launched Accessible Parking Permit Online Portal (APPOP) in December 2022
 for online renewal of accessible parking permit. Despite still a tool under testing and
 building, it has brought great convenience to parking permit holders to renew their
 permanent permits.
- RCD hosted the first in-person Fundraising Dinner Together We Care on December 2, 2022, and celebrated the 2022 International Day for Persons with Disabilities, since the COVIC-19 pandemic.
- RCD hosted the first in-person All Candidates Meeting for civic election in October 2022; since the COVIC-19 pandemic.

- RCD has launched a year-long fundraising campaign The Joy of Giving, on June 3, 2022; the event kick started a series of fundraising initiatives to re-position RCD in the community.
- 2020 marked the 35th anniversary of RCD.
- RCD hosted the first virtual Annual General Meeting on November 17, 2020; and
 inaugural online fundraising concert on November 13, 2020, 2020. For virtual
 programming, RCD had set up Zoom activities, RCD YouTube Channel, as well as
 started an online Get Good @ Series to share information and resources with the
 community, meanwhile aiming for global visibility and virtual representation of RCD.
- RCD remained financially vigilant in soliciting potential funding, including all COVID-19
 related benefits and subsidies from public and private sources. All permanent
 employees remained on the work team to provide continual services.
- RCD moved to a whole new setting in Lansdowne Centre in January 2019, with a theme of heightening the visibility of the organization in the heart of the community – RCD in the Community.
- In 2022, the RCD served 25,974 people in the community and provided close to 50,000 service hours. It has returned to the pre-pandemic level of core services and community engagement.
- Every year, close to 10,000 individuals with disabilities participated in centre-based activities, which include specialized Information & Networking services, Skills Training and Peer Support, Social Interaction, Life Skills Development, English Language Building, Basic & Advanced Computer Training, as well as Youth Support & Leadership, Chinese Support Group and Filipino Parents Support Group.
- The RCD conducted annually community awareness events, such as the Invisible Disability/Illness Forum in May, Access Awareness Month in June and International Day of Persons with Disabilities on December 3, to heighten awareness to disabilities issues in our communities.
- To our great loss, RCD's founder, Frances Clark, passed away on April 23, 2015; she
 was presented one of the most prestigious national awards the previous year: the
 Prime Minister's Volunteer Award for Lifelong Achievement.
- 2015 marked the 30th anniversary of RCD; they celebrated many accomplishments throughout the years, and were able to act more proactively to achieve their mission and goals.
- The RCD hosted the first Roll and Stroll Event in 2009, in partnership with Richmond Rotary Club, to raise funds supporting the programming for people with disabilities.
- In 2008, the RCD changed its name to the Richmond Centre for Disability with the
 purposes of the Society remaining the same; the change has better reflected the
 position and the role of RCD in the community and enabled it to be more relevant and
 responsive to its members.

- In 2008, the RCD relocated its physical centre to its second address. Since then they see significant increase in traffic and member participation; there are more recreational activities and skill development opportunities offered.
- In 2007, the RCD hosted its first annual Wheelchair Curling Bonspiel, which drew competitors from some International teams and from other parts of Canada. In 2019, a record breaking 16 teams participated included 4 international teams.
- In 2006, the RCD celebrated its 20th anniversary and hosted its inaugural Fundraising Gala.
- To promote the accessibility of the City of Richmond, the RCD created http://www.accessrichmond.ca in 2005 to provide information to tourists or people interested in moving to the area.
- Several major Conferences involving people with disabilities had been held in Richmond in recent years as a result of RCD's efforts to promote the City for its accessibility and suitability to host events that require accessible amenities. In 2005, the RCD hosted the Conference for Entrepreneurs with Disabilities, a great success with participation of over 300 delegates from all across the country, as well as played host to Independent Living Canada Annual General Meetings on two occasions.
- The RCD started to conduct Disability Awareness and Sensitivity Training Workshops to community members in 2005, and the service has grown as demands increase in recent years and RCD has built its reputation as an expert on disability issues.
- In 2003-2004, the Centre developed a manual on Service Delivery to people with disabilities from other cultures. This manual was translated into seven languages, and circulated to organizations across Canada.
- The Centre's informational websites http://www.rcdrichmond.org was established in 2001; it currently registers an average of over 130,000 page hits per month for 2023.
- Reflecting the diversity of the community, services and activities are available in both English and Chinese, while communication in other languages can also be provided.
- In September of 2000, the RCD established the Resource Centre, which is an
 accredited member of the Independent Living Canada. The Centre work is based on IL
 Canada guidelines, supporting the independent living movement. In 2023 the RCD was
 granted continual accreditation for the fourth time.
- The RCD recruited and trained volunteers working with people with disabilities through regular training and supervision; they have over 50 active volunteers monthly, and trained over 100 volunteers annually. In 2023 a total of 8,840 volunteer hours were recorded; which is showing an upward trend with volunteer engagement since the pandemic.
